Formalizing Our Neighborhood Watch Program

In the three-mile loop I call my neighborhood, there are 15 homes set off the beaten path of two gravel roads that cut through several hundred acres. Across the Parkway, I call folks along my 4.5 mile jogging loop my neighbors too.

Over the years, we've looked out for each other. We've returned our wandering pets, shared vegetables from our gardens, cleaned up garbage strewed by inconsiderate passersby, and called each other when we spotted anything suspicious.

While we already had an informal neighborhood watch program, we were missing two important elements that had the potential to make us much safer – information and the support of a local public safety team.

We filled those gaps last week by asking Chattahoochee Hills Police Chief Damon Jones to help us create a formal Neighborhood Watch Program.

Formalizing Our Neighborhood Watch Program

At our neighborhood watch meeting on January 21, Chief Jones introduced seven members from his cadre of public safety professionals and thanked them for attending the meeting on their time off. Our neighbors were very appreciative of Damon Jones, David Colley, Matt Rook, Jamie Melton, Ronnie Lyle, Hugh Beale, Craig Wall, and Thanh Nguyen for the time they spent educating us.

Chief Jones said our Neighborhood Watch Program would be the first formal Neighborhood Watch Program in the city. But unlike traditional programs that use block captains to coordinate activities in a city block, our program would require a different strategy to cover neighbors spread out over country miles. While he researches different national programs to see which model would work best in Chatt Hills, he suggested we continue with our plan to coordinate with neighbors in our two country loops.

What is the Neighborhood Watch Program?

The Neighborhood Watch Program teaches you the steps that you can take to help protect your home. It also organizes a neighborhood group which can make crime prevention part of every person's daily routine, just by watching out for each other. Our job as citizens is to report suspicious activity to police. It is their job to handle the crooks!

By formalizing our Neighborhood Watch Program, our neighbors made a commitment to meet with our public safety team twice a year for additional training. We may also receive Neighborhood Watch road signs to alert passersby that we are serious about protecting our neighborhood and won't think twice about reporting suspicious activities to police.

What we learned

Sgt. David Colley, who is responsible for community programs in Chatt Hills, is the point of contact for our Neighborhood Watch Program. He gave us several informational handouts and stressed the following points:

1. Get to know your neighbors. Know their names and be able to identify them and their vehicles by site.
2. Maintain a map of your immediate neighborhood with names and addresses.
3. Make sure your address is marked clearly on BOTH sides of your mail box.
4. Make the homes as unattractive to burglars as possible. Keep bushes trimmed, use deadbolt locks, turn on alarm systems when you leave, lock doors whenever you leave, even to work in the yard.
5. Mark all property for identification. Use your drivers' license number or last four of your social security number. Do NOT use your full social security number.
6. Be observant, and watch over your neighbors' homes.
7. Use Chattahoochee Hills Zone Patrol when going on vacation to have police check on your home.
8. Write down license numbers and descriptions of suspicious-looking vehicles and persons and report them to police immediately.
9. When you see a problem, call 911.

The last point was probably the most important. Sgt. Colley said that citizens only think of calling 911 for dire emergencies, but that 911 now does priority dispatch. So if you report a suspicious car in your neighborhood at the same time your neighbor calls for a medical emergency, 911 will dispatch the medical emergency first.

Question and answer session

The best part of our Neighborhood Watch Meeting was having the opportunity to ask questions throughout the meeting and talk to the public safety team afterwards. A few of our Q&A follow:

1. What is the best self-defense weapon a citizen can use?

Pepper spray is an effective self-defense weapon. It comes in a variety of sizes and strengths, is easy to use and has a broad aim, and can incapacitate the attacker for 30 or 40 minutes, giving you time to quickly flee. A handgun is only effective if you know how to use it, have time to aim, and actually hit the attacker. If an attacker takes the gun away from you, you could be fatally injured.

2. What are the most common fire hazards around the house?

Extension cords placed under area rugs are big fire hazards. Residents also need to be especially careful when disposing of ashes from their fireplaces. Ashes can remain hot for up to a week or more, so don't dump them in the woods or with your other garbage.

3. What other hazards should we be aware of in our homes?

High levels of carbon dioxide accumulation inside the home can cause health problems such as nausea, dizziness, or vomiting. To prevent a buildup of carbon dioxide use a balanced, mechanical ventilation system, make sure gas burning appliances are properly ventilated, and regularly check on all fuel-burning appliances.

4. Do we need a permit to burn leaves?

Yes, a permit is required, but it doesn't cost anything. The purpose of the permit is to notify public safety in the event a burn gets out of control, or if a neighbor reports that they see smoke in the neighborhood.

5. How can our Chatt Hills public safety team help us?

The Fire Department offers free blood pressure tests. It will also give you advice on where to place smoke detectors and inspect your home for fire hazards, upon request. The Police Department will drive by your home when you're on vacation.

6. Is there anything else we can do to increase our safety? Chattahoochee Hills will be offering a Citizens' Police Academy in the near future to help interested residents become more informed about public safety.

Spring is Coming!

After New Year's revelry is over and winter's moodiness sets in, spirits sometimes sag, but when those seed catalogs start pouring in, you know spring is on the way. When I receive catalogs in January, I spend hours reading about new and old varieties, taking notes, and making cuts like a judge in a beauty pageant. And beyond the vast selections from catalogs there are seeds shared by friends, relatives, and seed-saving organizations.

What's the best reason for starting your own seeds? Selection! For example, a seed catalog specializing in tomatoes presents a particular challenge for the tomato lover by offering more than 200 varieties. This easily makes tomato seedling selections from any nursery seem like a limited menu indeed.

When to start your seedlings: Resist that urge to start everything in January just so you can see something young and green. If you start seed too soon, the plant may languish inside, waiting for settled weather. Check your last date of frost and group your seeds according to starting date. Label your varieties and their starting dates. And remember that some seeds take longer to germinate than others. Here's a rough estimate of the lead time for popular seeds:

- Onions: 8 to 12 weeks before the set out date of 4 to 6 weeks before last -frost.
- Lettuce: 5 to 6 weeks before the safe planting-out date, which is 4 to 5 weeks before the last frost.
- Cabbage, broccoli, collards: 5 to 6 weeks before planting out.
- Peppers: 8 to 12 weeks before the last frost.
- Eggplant and Tomatoes: 6 to 8 weeks before the last frost.
- Cucumbers and melons: 2 to 4 weeks before the last frost.

Wait until the weather is warm and settled to plant out your peppers, eggplant, tomatoes, cucumbers, and melons. For (much, much) more, please visit <http://www.vegetablegardener.com/item/2459/seed-starting-strategies>.


